



Total watering bans went into effect in metro Atlanta counties to conserve the area's dwindling water supply in Lake Lanier. The Southeast's record-setting drought also exacerbated the ongoing water conflict between Georgia, Florida, and Alabama. Georgia contends that outflows from the Lake to its neighbors are excessive, while Florida and Alabama (which uses the water to cool its Farley nuclear power plant) blame Atlanta's uncontrolled development. In November, with less than 90 days' water supply remaining, the Corps of Engineers reduced the Lake's outflows, and anyone caught watering their lawn faced a \$1,000 fine. *Image courtesy of Gregory Miller.*
